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#### Interior Secretary Haaland tours Mississippi Tribal Lands

CHOCTAW, Miss. – (January 13, 2024) – Choctaw Tribal Chief Cyrus Ben hosted Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland as she toured the homelands of the Mississippi Choctaws. Members of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) were also in attendance for this very important event.

The leadership delegates visited the Chahta Immi Cultural Center (CICC), Choctaw Central High School campus (CCHS), surveyed the future site of the new Choctaw Central school campus, the newly constructed MBCI Boys and Girls Club Teen Center, and other sites.

Secretary Haaland, BIA Eastern Regional Director Kimberly Bouchard, BIE Director Tony Dearman, and BIE Education Program Administrator Dr. Connie Albert made the visit to meet with Tribal representatives and discuss current Indian education reform initiatives.

"Having Secretary Haaland, the first Native American to serve as a cabinet secretary, visit us here in Choctaw is a proud moment for our Tribe," said Tribal Chief Cyrus Ben. "During my visits to the Nation's capital, my topmost priority is for our Tribe to have a

On Friday, January 19, we had a Sound the Alarm event. Members of the American Red Cross came to Choctaw to team up with our Choctaw Fire/Rescue officials and other volunteers and went to the Rolling Hills/149 and Goat Ranch area. 50 smoke detectors were installed in residences that will help protect 107 people.

I was honored to welcome the group and was grateful for the work they were doing to help our Tribal Members. The group was divided into six teams and went out into the community. After about three hours of work, the group came back to the Choctaw Fire Station for a delicious, boxed lunch, courtesy of Pearl River Resort.

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## CTS hosts 21st FLL Tournament

The Choctaw Tribal Schools held the 21st Annual FIRST LEGO League (FLL) Tournament on Saturday, January 27, 2024, inside the Pearl River Elementary School Gymnasium in Choctaw.

FLL is a hands-on, interactive engineering program that captivates students' interest in science and technology as they learn problem solving and team building skills.



## Reed is preserving nature,

**her culture** by Vickie D. King, Mississippi Today

A hint of fall touched the leaves in trees surrounding the swampy area traversed by Beaver Creek Road on Choctaw land in Neshoba County.

Mitzi Reed cruised along in her Jeep, keeping an eye out for invasive plants and wildlife. Reed is also on the lookout for her favorite critters, snakes, although she admits the weather is a bit cool for them to be out. Nevertheless, her eyes scan the swamp land adjacent to the Pearl River, just in case.



"My love for the land, for being outdoors ... a lot of it had to do with my dad. He loved being outdoors. Hunting, fishing, just being in the woods, and I'd tag right along. I was like his "righthand man," Reed says with a shrug of her shoulders and a big smile at the memory. "I got to where I loved it as well. I love animals, especially snakes," said Reed, as she stepped off the road, scanning the ground covered in leaves. "It's probably too cool out for them anyway, but you never know."

"I was going to be a vet. My degree is in biology. Getting a job in Animal Control got my foot in the door. There was a Choctaw environmental program and (late) Chief (Phillip)

Martin created a biologist position within the program. It opened the door for conservation-based research."

"This area of the South is so diverse. Everything grows here. Everything thrives, and that includes invasive animals and plants. Take wild hogs for example. They eat anything and everything, and can destroy an area before moving on. What is left in their wake leaves nothing for native animals. So, they move on, too," said Reed, holding a rabbit stick she carved.

The rabbit stick is a primitive hunting weapon made of hickory. Once a rabbit is chased from its hiding place, the rabbit stick is hurled at it. A powerful, stealthy and effective weapon.

"People are surprised to learn there are even feral horses about. And think about kudzu. Wherever you see it, it's taking over, choking out native plants. My work encompasses all the tribes, sharing my knowledge to combat the invasion from all of it."

#### Tribal communities gain GIS skills through **MSU** institute

STARKVILLE, Miss.—A Mississippi State University (MSU) research institute is helping to develop geographic information systems (GIS) skills in tribal communities across the country.

An online training program established by MSU's Geosystems Research Institute in partnership with the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) has provided GIS training for more than 500 individuals in tribal communities, boosting skills in land management, environmental conservation, community development and more.

The program was launched in 2023 to help the BIA meet

"The Mississippi State training partnership with the Branch of Geospatial Support has

been extremely beneficial to the Bureau of Indian Affairs employees and Federally Recognized Tribes," said David Vogt, chief of the BIA's Branch of Geospatial Support. "It allows us to have many more students in each class than we were previously able to provide and at a lower cost. This allows more BIA employees and particularly tribes to take trainings they wouldn't have had access to before."

The two-week, self-paced classes cover key topics and software such as ArcGIS Pro,

QGIS and Python.

Roddy Nickey, director of land management and GIS for the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians and a two-time MSU graduate, said the training complements the GIS work he has been conducting for more than a decade and helps him stay up-to-date on the latest software tools.

The Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians manages approximately 35,000 acres of property in the state.

"The training equips tribal and community members with the knowledge and skills needed to effectively use GIS technologies by providing hands-on training and it helps build the capacity of individuals within tribal communities to collect, analyze and visualize geospatial data, which will increase efficiency," Nickey said.

"Also, by gaining GIS expertise, individuals can pursue a career in various fields such as land management, environmental planning, emergency

> management and cultural resources."

systems Research Institute has a long track record of providing GIS training to public-and-private sector individuals through longstanding partnerships with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.


The GEO Project, led by Assistant Extension Professor John Cartwright and funded by NOAA's National Ocean Service's Office for Coastal Management, was created in 2006 and has provided training to more than 5,000 participants.



# Sound the Alarm event held in Choctaw

Are you prepared for a home fire? According to officials, home fires claim seven lives every day, but having working smoke alarms can cut the risk of death by half.

The American Red Cross, working with the Choctaw Fire Department, participated in the nationwide Sound the Alarm event on Friday, January 19, with the objective of raising awareness of the dangers of house fires and installing

free smoke detectors in Tribal homes on MBCI Tribal lands.

Most of us don't realize we have just two minutes to escape a home fire - which is the nation's most frequent disaster. The American Red Cross is preparing families to act quickly through their Home Fire Campaign.

Beginning in the Pearl River community, six teams comprised of officials and volunteers from the Red Cross and Choctaw Fire Department traveled throughout the community to inform Tribal residents about having up to date and proper working smoke detectors in the household.

If a household did not have a smoke detector or one that

wasn't operational, one was installed for free if needed.

Choctaw Fire Department & American Red Cross teamed up to provide free smoke detectors to Tribal homes.

Over 50 alarms were installed in residences that will help protect over 100 people in Pearl River.

Every home needs a working smoke detector. You may need a new one if it doesn't work when tested or if it is over 10 years old.

To check your smoke detector, press the "test" button, listen for 3 beeps to indicate it's operational, and check the date to see if it's less then 10 years old.

Officials say smoke detectors need to be placed in every sleeping area and on every level of a home. Also, if it is found to be malfunctioning, it needs

to be promptly replaced.

This spring, more Sound the Alarm events will be hosted in the Tribal communities. During the upcoming Choctaw Tribal Schools' Spring Festivals, officials with the Choctaw Fire Department will be in attendance to sign up families who want to receive a free smoke detector and have it installed in their homes.
